

## SYLLABUS FOR MATH 1C -- Calculus

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Class Time and Location	MTWR 12:30-2:45 S16																										
Course Description	Infinite series, lines and surfaces in three dimensions, vectors in two and three dimensions, parametric equations of curves. Derivatives and integrals of vector functions.																										
Course Text	<i>Calculus: Early Transcendental, 7th edition, by James Stewart, published by Thomson Brooks/Cole, 2008.</i> Strongly suggest students also purchase the Student's Solution Manual.																										
Course SLO	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Graphically, analytically, numerically and verbally analyze infinite sequences and Objectives: series from the perspective of convergence, using correct notation and mathematical precision.</li> <li>2. Apply infinite sequences and series in approximating functions.</li> <li>3. Synthesize and apply vectors, polar coordinate system and parametric representations In solving problems in analytic geometry, including motion in space.</li> </ol>																										
Required Materials	The textbook, a graphing calculator (TI-83 or 84 is preferred if you are buying a new calculator. If you already have a TI-82, 85, or 86, you can use that.)																										
Course Prerequisites	Mathematics 1B with a grade of C or better; or equivalent. Advisory: English Writing 211 and Reading 211 (or Language Arts 211), or English as a Second Language 272 and 273.																										
Method of Instruction	This class will consist of lectures and in-class discussion. There will also be boardwork and in-class group assignments which you are expected to participate in.

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Tests and Quizzes	There will be two in-class tests, each counting as 20%. If you miss a test due to what I consider an emergency and you provide appropriate documentations, I will replace that																										

one grade with your final. If I don't consider your reasoning as an emergency, you will receive a zero for that test. Regardless, you will get zero for any other missed tests, emergency or not. No makeups for the final can be provided. The final grade cannot be dropped.

Quizzes will be given randomly at any part of the class period. There are **absolutely no makeup quizzes**. A missed quiz for any reason (including coming late or leaving early) will count as a zero.

<b>Homework</b>	In the course schedule I have included a list of suggested homework problems from each sections. You are responsible to do at least all of the suggested problems. You are responsible to know how to do ALL of the problems. There is a direct correlation between your level of comfort with the homework problems and your success in this class. If I feel a majority of you are not doing the homework, I may increase the number of quizzes or start collecting the homework from each section.
<b>Class Attendance and Faculty Initiated Withdrawal Policy</b>	<b>A student who discontinues coming to class and does not drop the course will get an F. It is the student's responsibility to drop the course.</b> Attendance is mandatory, and counts as 5% of your total grade. Every absence, tardiness, or early departure for any reason results in a loss of 1%. If a student misses three classes, he or she may be dropped. However the the ultimate responsibility of dropping the course lies with the student. <b>I reserve the right to lock the door at the beginning of each class or after a possible break to discourage tardiness.</b> You are responsible to come to class on time every day.
<b>Withdrawal Policy</b>	The withdrawal deadline is in your <b>MyPortal</b> . If students withdraw before this date, they will receive a "W". After this date, an "F".
